FROM THE DEACON'S DESK.....

Remember the Easter joy of a few weeks ago? Is that Joy beginning to fade just a bit? We are still in the Easter season -as evidenced by the flowers in the sanctuary and the white vestments. There are 50 days between Easter and Pentecost. This time is called the Easter season. Our ancestors found great symbolic meaning in these 50 days. Fifty days is seven weeks (a week of weeks) plus one day. That extra day is the Eighth Day, or Sunday, the Day of Resurrection. Fifty days is also just about one-seventh of the whole year, so these 50 days hold the same relationship to the year as Sunday does to the week. While 50 days of absolute joy may seem hard for us to sustain, we are encouraged to ponder the meaning of Easter and rejoice in the gift of resurrection -eternal life. In a few weeks, at Pentecost, we will rejoice again in the gift of the Holy Spirit! Easter Blessing, Deacon Ray

Back to art after beating cancer

Konop says faith helped him battle rare form of cancer, return to his passion

TWO RIVERS — Dean Konop has created hundreds of caricatures over the years. From Green Bay Packers quarterback Brett Favre to “Star Trek” actor Leonard Nimoy to area families attending summer festivals, Konop has covered the gamut.

But it’s not often he’s asked to present Jesus Christ in the form of caricatures.

Konop is one of 10 members of St. Peter the Fisherman Parish who utilized their artistic talents to create Stations of the Cross this Lenten season.

The Catholic faith has been important throughout Konop’s life, especially in 2005, when he was diagnosed with a very rare type of cancer that resulted in a quarter-sized tumor growing in his sinus.

“When I was told I had cancer, I was in shock and saddened,” Konop said. “The doctors said that within six weeks

I could die. We had a family get-together and discussed what kind of things we could do.”

Konop said he tried to continue drawing throughout his treatments, but the chemotherapy and radiation affected the nerves in his fingers.

“I couldn’t get the right touch on the pencil because it always seemed like my fingers were sleeping,” he said. “Whenever I tried to draw it was very disheartening because I knew what I wanted to do but I couldn’t do it.”

Konop said he feared he would no longer be able to draw.

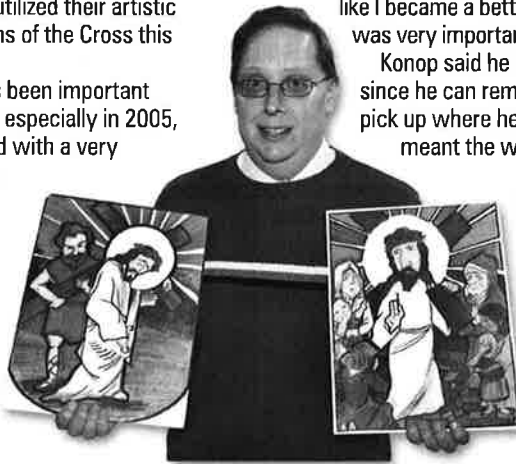
“I was very afraid art wouldn’t be there. But my family and I prayed and said many ‘Our Fathers,’” he recalled. “Eventually, the art came back and I feel like I became a better artist after that. Faith was very important in that whole process.”

Konop said he has been drawing ever since he can remember. So being able to pick up where he left off after treatments meant the world to him.

“As long as I’m doing some kind of art, I’m pretty happy,” Konop said.

Hmong egg roll sale raises funds for Holy Land pilgrimage

GREEN BAY — Twenty-five years ago, Bao Kong had the opportunity to travel to the Holy Land, but the timing was not right. She is not about to miss out a second time.

“In 1990, my kids were young so I could not afford to go,” she said. “I cried because I couldn’t go. This time, I said, ‘I’m going to make it.’ I want to go to Bethlehem to see where Jesus was born.”

The Hmong Catholic Community of the Diocese of Green Bay is planning a pilgrimage to

the Holy Land for February of 2017. Fundraising efforts are underway, including the April 18 egg roll sale in the St. Jude Church basement. Egg roll sales are held regularly by the community in support of the Hmong Catholic Community. Proceeds from the last two sales were designated to support members from Green Bay and Appleton who will make the Holy Land trip. Approximately 40 pilgrims are currently committed to the tour.

“I have a priest-friend who will go straight from Thailand to the Holy Land to meet us,” said Kong. “This will be his first time, so he is

really happy about it.”

She has also invited two priests from the diocese who are considering the pilgrimage. Deacon Shuying “Joe” Vang of St. Bernard Parish, Appleton, who ministers to the Hmong Catholic Community, will be among the pilgrims.

“We are planning for 11 or 12 days,” said Kong. “Some people want to see Mount Sinai (in Egypt). It’s the first trip for most of the group.”

5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

About Pentecost

- 1 Pentecost (May 24) falls 50 days after Easter. The feast marks the end of the Easter season.
- 2 "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word for "50" or "pentekoste."
- 3 Pentecost is also an older Jewish harvest festival — called *Shavuot* — that marks 50 days after the second day of Passover. This Jewish feast honors God giving the Law to Moses at Sinai.
- 4 Because the Holy Spirit descended on those in the Upper Room, some Christians call Pentecost the "birthday of the church."
- 5 Since the early days of the church, Pentecost has been called White Sunday or Whitsunday; this is the last day when the newly initiated wore their white albs at Mass.

We dedicate this entire six-year period to the Holy Spirit. He is really the one that is going to lead this journey of the Diocese of Green Bay for the next six years. on the Way." I ask you to join me in the spirit of Christ and in this new moment in the church's history by reaching out more deeply by giving yourselves to the Lord for his purposes. In the words of Pope Francis, "I invite everyone to be bold and creative in this task of rethinking the goals, structures, style and methods of evangelization in their respective communities." (Evangelii Gaudium #33)

Once we give our life to the Lord, we have to continue giving. Every day we may have the tendency to pull back some gift that we've given. And yet, if we give him our lives as totally and completely as we can each and every day, he will use them bountifully to bring many blessings and to save many souls!

ALLOUEZ — Bishop David Ricken will once again lead a three-day "Wisconsin Shrine Pilgrimage" to approved Marian shrines. This year's pilgrimage — featuring stops at the Basilica of the National Shrine of Mary, Help of Christians at Holy Hill; the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, La Crosse; and the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help, Champion — will take place in October.

Pilgrims will board the motor coach at 7:45 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 12, at the Diocese of Green Bay campus, 1825 Riverside Drive, Green

Bay, for departure to Holy Hill in Hubertus.

On Oct. 13, pilgrims will have free time to see devotional areas at the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe prior to a directed tour of the shrine church and works of art.

The final day of the pilgrimage, the motor coach is expected to arrive at the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help early in the afternoon.
