Mleziva ordained deacon in Rome

Local Catholics attend Sept. 29 ordination; priestly ordination next

ALLOUEZ — Mark Mleziva has experienced some special moments in Rome. He was present at the canonizations of both St. John Paul II and St. Teresa of Calcutta (or Kolkata). He has served at Mass for Pope Francis, which required him to shave his goatee, but “it was well worth it,” he said. “He greeted us all before, and I was star struck to say the least.”

Mleziva added another special moment on Sept. 29 when he was ordained a deacon by Cardinal Sean O’Malley at St. Peter’s Basilica. He was one of 30 American seminarians of Vatican City’s Pontifical North American College ordained at the Mass with a congregation of well over 1,000 people.

Deacon Adam Bradley, who was ordained a deacon in May, vested Deacon Mleziva. Both are scheduled to be ordained to the priesthood, along with Deacons Matthew Rappi, Jon Thorsen and Zach Weber, in June of 2017.

“I asked (Deacon Bradley) first and foremost because he is a good friend, and as a sign of soli-

arity with the rest of the class from the diocese,” explained Deacon Mleziva.

Other supporters who made the trip included his parents, Rod and Karen; older brother Matthew and his wife, Amanda; younger brother Mitchell; younger sister Mariah; as well as aunts, uncles

and other family friends. Fr. Daniel Schuster, vocation director, and Fr. Scott Valentyn, parochial vicar at St. John the Baptist Parish, Howard, also attended the ordination.

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Former Packers standout Mike McCoy visits Fr. Allouez Catholic School

ALLOUEZ — Former Packers defensive tackle Mike McCoy hung up his cleats more than 35 years ago, but at 6’5” and 310 pounds, he still resembles in stature the first round draft pick who pressured quarterbacks and corralled ball carriers. McCoy, who played 11 seasons in the NFL, seven with the Packers, returned to his first pro football home on Oct. 5 to speak to stu-

dents at the Resurrection Campus of Fr. Allouez Catholic School. His presentation, “Champions for Today,” is designed to empower young people to make better decisions in their lives.

McCoy, who now lives in Ponte Vedra, Fla., speaks to Catholic school students throughout the country as part of Mike McCoy Ministries. He fittingly donned his number 76 Packers jersey for the talk. He also wears his number 77 University of Notre Dame jersey for school

visits. A highlight video chronicled McCoy’s family life, NFL career, seasons for the Fighting Irish and his high school years at Cathedral Prep in Erie, Pa.

“God gives each one of us unique talents and gifts,” he said. “I think that one of the greatest words in the English language is perseverance. Never ever give up.”

The Lateran Basilica

- 1 Nov. 9 is the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica.
- 2 St. John Lateran is the pope's cathedral in his role of Bishop of Rome. Pope Pius XI and Benito Mussolini signed the Lateran Treaty here on Feb. 11, 1929, establishing the Vatican City State.
- 3 The basilica's full name is "The Patriarchal Basilica of the Most Holy Savior and St. John the Baptist at the Lateran."
- 4 The Lateran Basilica was originally the home of a Roman senator, Plautius Lateranus. Nero had him killed and confiscated his property in 65 A.D. The Emperor Constantine gave the palace to Pope Melchisedes in 313 A.D.
- 5 Once remodeled, the palace was officially dedicated on Nov. 9, 324, by Pope Sylvester I.

We are abundantly blessed in the Diocese of Green Bay. I still continue to be amazed at the kindness and generosity shown by so many in our parishes, our schools and our communities. Yet, as we form our consciences for this election, we must put to the forefront of our minds not only our needs, but the needs of those individuals who are struggling, the forgotten, the lowly, the vulnerable, the voiceless. Because of our faith in Christ Jesus, we must be the salt of the earth and light of the world, and we do that by seeking a human encounter based on humility and dialogue. Pope Francis reminds each of us, "Today, amid so much darkness, we need to see the light of hope and to be women and men who bring hope to others."

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From the Principal

Gratitude: The Heart of Thanksgiving

In the United States, Thanksgiving Day is a holiday that is among the nation's finest national traditions. Indeed, setting a day aside for giving thanks to God is not just a U.S. phenomenon. Canadians have a Thanksgiving Day, and many countries worldwide celebrate harvest festivals that express gratitude to God.

For Christian stewards, Thanksgiving Day has special meaning, for we know that gratitude lies at the very heart of stewardship. A grateful heart heralds the beginning of discipleship and opens the way to our deepest response, the desire to return to God for the bounty of our lives.

The French educator Jean Baptiste Massieu put it so beautifully: "Gratitude is the memory of the heart."

For what do we thank our Creator? The early American colonists, who gave inspiration to the Thanksgiving Day tradition, were thankful for their very survival in a harsh and unforgiving environment. Many of their compatriots were buried in the soil of their new land, far from all that had been cherished and familiar.

It's natural to thank God when things seem to turn out the way we had hoped, when disaster is averted, when life seems filled with

abundance. Harder, perhaps, is the ability to thank God for being present to us in times of struggle, seeming failure, illness and death. But, in the heart of the Christian steward, the memory of God's presence is a comfort and a gift all its own.

If we take time to reflect on our lives, we often discover that for which we are most grateful was a gift which we struggled to receive. What came to us in the form of hardship has in hindsight revealed itself as a gift. This is why each day's struggles and trials should be met with a heartfelt "thank you."

Meister Eckhart, the 14th century Dominican mystic, wrote, "If the only prayer you ever say is 'thank you,' that will suffice." At first, this seems puzzling. What of praise and petition? But Eckhart knew that the most genuine response, and indeed, the first and most spontaneous response of the heart which has discovered God, is "thank you." We teach our students to be thankful for everything they receive and to give gratitude to God when beginning their prayer. Gratitude lies at the beginning of true prayer.

As we reflect on this time of thanksgiving, let us be present to those moments when God's gifts were hidden in the shadow and remember to be thankful for all. In doing so, may we cultivate a perpetual attitude of gratitude for the many miracles found all around us.
