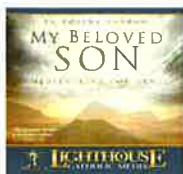

Father, son join cast of Northeast Wisconsin Passion Play

Bob Noll says having son, Matt, act in Lenten play helps build his confidence

APPLETON — Bob and Peggy Noll's family has seen their share of stage time at St. Francis Xavier High School. Their daughter and two older sons were part of the Christmas Stars cast with Bob for about 11 years. In recent years, Bob's been involved in The Northeast Wisconsin Passion Play.

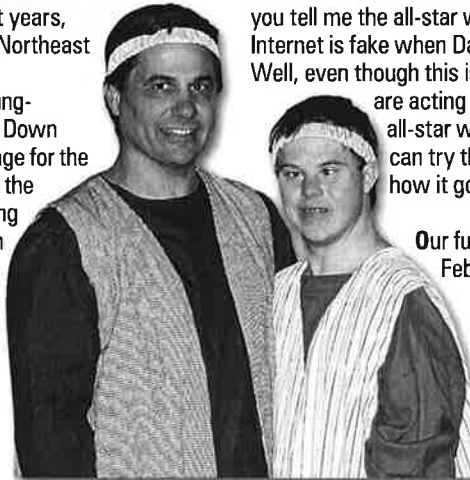
Last year, the couple's youngest child, Matt, 23, who has Down syndrome, joined Bob on stage for the first time as a fellow actor in the Passion Play. Bob was looking for something he and his son could do together, since the older kids were out of the household. He also wanted to help Matt become a part of a larger community.

"My reason for getting him involved was similar as my other children and

that is to provide opportunities to build confidence in front of a group, be part of a Christian family environment and do things outside of your comfort zone," said Bob, a member of St. Bernard Parish.

For Matt, his biggest worry was being a part of the crucifixion scene, so the original plan was for him to work backstage in the second act of the show. However, at the last minute things changed and Matt was selected to be a guard in that scene. Later that night, Matt told Bob that he was uncomfortable with the role. "I told him, 'You know how you tell me the all-star wrestling you watch on the Internet is fake when Dad expresses concerns? Well, even though this is based on a true story, we

are acting or pretending, similar to all-star wrestlers. Do you think we can try this once or twice and see how it goes?'" Bob said.

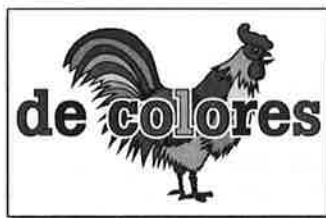

Cursillo celebrates half century in Green Bay Diocese

ALLOUEZ — A movement of the Catholic Church that serves as an instrument of renewal will mark a half century in the Diocese of Green Bay this year.

In 1965 — two years after they made a Cursillo in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee — Ed Gagnon, Mike Ariens, Lyle Becker, Jo DuPont and John Steckart, with assistance from



five men from Milwaukee, put on the first Cursillo weekend in the diocese. The first diocesan women's Cursillo was held a year later with Jean Frederick

as rector and Joanie Steckart as vice rector.

Cursillo (Kur-see-yo) is a Spanish word, which means "short course." A Cursillo weekend begins on Thursday evening and closes the following Sunday evening. The format includes 15 talks, discussion, daily Mass, reconciliation and prayer.

More than 200 Cursillo weekends have been held in the diocese with more than 7,000

Cursillistas (participants) attending.

The 50-year anniversary celebration will be held on Sept. 20. Mass with Fr. Walter Stumpf, Fr. Willie Van de Loo and Fr. Dave Pleier, spiritual director, is scheduled for 3 p.m. at St. Nicholas Church in Freedom, followed by the celebration at Colonial Lanes.

5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

About The RCIA

- 1 RCIA stands for a process called the "Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults."
- 2 Those who enter the Catholic Church through the RCIA are called "catechumens," because they are being prepared to receive the sacraments for the first time.
- 3 Catechumens formally become the Elect at the Rite of Election on the First Sunday of Lent and they receive the "sacraments of initiation" at the Easter Vigil.
- 4 The sacraments of initiation are baptism, confirmation and holy Communion.
- 5 The ancient church welcomed new members through the catechumenate; the Second Vatican Council restored the catechumenate and a new rite (the RCIA) was approved by Rome in 1972. The current U.S. rite was mandated by the U.S. Catholic bishops in 1988.



PHASE II: FORMATION IN DISCIPLESHIP

The second phase is called "Formation in Discipleship" (2016-2018). Since the Synod of Bishops on the New Evangelization, many discipleship training and formation processes and programs have emerged. In our own diocese, we have a newly created department called the Department of New Evangelization. In that department are the offices

of adult faith formation, campus ministry, young adult formation and new evangelization. This department will help all of us learn what it truly means to be disciples as well as how to make new disciples in our church.

Christ is calling each of us to deepen our prayer lives and the most intimate way to experience this encounter is in the holy sacrifice of the Mass. This encounter in the Eucharist overflows in love and leads us to turn to him in our daily prayers. The culmination of our daily prayers finds its highest expression in the celebration of Sunday Mass. As such, much of the focus for our primary efforts will be on those of us who are already coming to Sunday Mass as we work to deepen our prayer lives and learn to ask others to come to church with us. Donor sought to help ship rosaries to missionaries

GREEN BAY — Would anyone like to help ship rosaries to missionaries around the world?

Since 2002, Charlie Doperalski of Green Bay supported the shipping costs for rosaries sent from parishes around the diocese to missionaries. That year, Charlie first contacted the World Mission Services (WMS) of the Diocese of Green Bay with the idea of collecting rosaries for missionaries. Charlie and his daughter had been sending rosaries to a mission in Africa.

The average monthly shipping cost is \$152. Charlie Doperalski, 76, died on Jan. 9 this year. Now WMS is looking for someone to take up Charlie's work.

"We need a new benefactor for shipping costs for our rosary mission," said Cindy St. Aubin. She said that shipping costs are still about \$150 per month and that new requests from missionaries come in every week.
