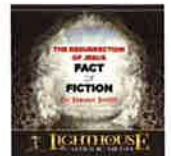

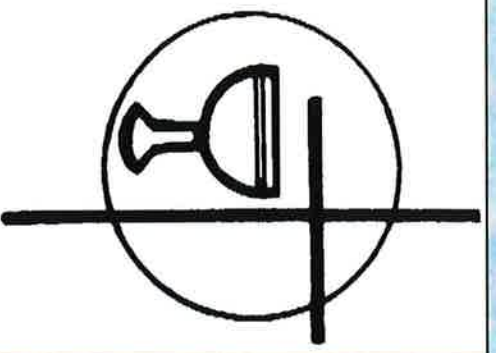

He has the keys to a faithful life

Centenarian Courtland Smith still drives himself to church every week

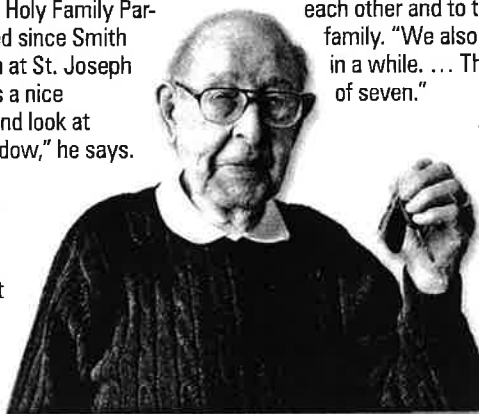

MARINETTE — Courtland Smith enjoys driving around the Marinette/Menominee area. He was born and raised here and has spent the entirety of his life between these two cities, faithfully attending Mass at St. Joseph, St. Ann, Holy Spirit, and presently, Our Lady of Lourdes churches. "I'm in the car every day," he says.

Smith is 100 year old.

St. Joseph and Our Lady of Lourdes are the church sites that make up Holy Family Parish. Not much has changed since Smith made his first Communion at St. Joseph over 90 years ago. "That's a nice church, when you get in and look at that big stained glass window," he says. "It's nice there."

This brazen centenarian is still as sharp as a tack and his dedicated Mass attendance is a testament to that. Each week after picking up his sister, Camille Lemire, 96, he attends 4 p.m. Mass



And there's more. From there, he heads back over to Our Lady of Lourdes in order to arrive at 4 p.m. sharp.

at Our Lady of Lourdes. "I go sit by my friends and she goes and sits by her friends," says Smith.

Even inclement weather doesn't seem to bother him. "Don't make no difference, as long as the car starts."

This year's winter has been particularly kind to him, except for the cold. "It's not bad snow this year yet. The cold is hard. When it's minus-20, the car starts, but holy cow!"

Weekend Mass isn't the only recurring event he's willing to scrape his car windshield off to attend.

Smith visits his sister at the Luther Home every Wednesday at 2 p.m. when they have Mass and say the rosary. Even though they don't sit together at Mass, these weekly visits keep them close to each other and to the memory of their large family. "We also like going out to lunch once in a while. ... There's only two of us left out of seven."

Cathedral rector extends invitation to Catholics to make a pilgrimage

GREEN BAY — Fr. Joseph Dorner wants to open wide the doors of St. Francis Xavier Cathedral and welcome all Catholics from the Green Bay Diocese to step inside.

Now in his seventh month as rector, Fr. Dorner is leading an initiative to remind members of the diocese that, while the cathedral is a parish, it is also the central church of the diocese. "In a way, everyone who is a member of this diocese belongs to the cathedral," Fr. Dorner told The Compass. "You have a home

away from home. This is your 'church away from church.'"

The cathedral is home to several diocesan events, including the chrism Mass (when Bishop David Ricken blesses the holy oils that are used throughout the year in parishes), ordinations and Masses for the health care and legal communities. But guests are welcome to the cathedral any time, said Fr. Dorner.

In hopes of bringing awareness to this invitation, Fr. Dorner recently wrote a letter to pastors and parish leaders across the diocese. "This church ... belongs to all of us," he wrote.

Fr. Dorner has a list of things people can do to promote the cathedral as a place of pilgrimage. First, he invites Catholics to join the "Keepers of the Cathedral," a group of volunteers who welcome visitors on weekdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Another offering that Fr. Dorner introduced this year was celebrating Ash Wednesday Mass at 6 a.m. for people who work downtown. "Whenever there is a holy day of obligation on a work day, we are going to have that 6 a.m. Mass," said Fr. Dorner.

5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW About the Easter candle

- 1 The Easter Candle, or Paschal Candle, is lit from the Easter fire at the Easter Vigil.
- 2 The candle will be lit at each Mass of the Easter season, and each baptism and funeral throughout the year.
- 3 The priest embeds five grains of incense, in a cross shape, into the candle. They represent Christ's five wounds.
- 4 The candle is also marked with the year: "2015" and the Greek letters "Alpha" and "Omega," symbolizing "the beginning and end."
- 5 The Easter candle is made of fine beeswax, at least 75 percent pure, since it represents Christ's glorious, risen body.



PHASE III: FORMATION IN MISSION

The third phase is called "Formation in Mission" (2018-2020). During this phase, we will strive to grow in our call to become missionaries. We will assist all those who have increased and ramped up their level of discipleship to reach out further beyond the boundaries to people they may not be familiar with. We will find ways to

witness and share the good news of the holy Gospel; especially by engaging more actively in the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

In our diocese we have many Christians who are actively engaged in corporal works of mercy — feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, taking care of the sick and dying and reaching out to those on the margins. I ask that we always ensure that our works of charity are centered on Christ and his church. Jesus is the source of this charity and should be made visible through these acts of love. As the church, we reach out in love and in the love of Jesus to those who have less than we do, not just with material goods, but also with spiritual goods, by introducing them to Christ. I am asking you to help them to come to a more prayerful life, personally and as families, and, God willing, as active members in the church. As Pope

Former Packers coach says faith helps him overcome challenges

DEPERE — Former Green Bay Packers head coach Mike Sherman received a rousing standing ovation following his keynote address at "A Day for Men," Saturday, March 14, at St. Norbert Abbey. Sherman addressed faith, which he described as "the important stuff."

"I've wrestled with God a bunch of times," he said. "I felt like he has abandoned me at times. You are dealing with an imperfect person."

"For 50 years of my life, everything went exactly as I had planned," explained Sherman, 60. "Everything was perfect. I always

got the job. I had never been fired from a job. God and I were on the same wavelength. We were talking back and forth. I thought, 'this is how it is supposed to be.' I felt good about my Christianity and I felt very comfortable sharing that with other people."

Sherman said the effort he put forth with the Packers made his dismissal more difficult.

"I put so much into that job. My heart was into that job. I put more time than I probably should have into that job," he said. "My family sacrificed because of all the time I spent at the office. My faith sacrificed. I put God in a box and took him down when I needed him."
